## What's New in Que Pasa Grecia

#### **Miscellaneous**

**Costa Rica Independence Day** – It's Monday, 15 September. So, remember, all government offices, banks and most businesses will be closed.

**Change Is Coming to Grecia** – We have heard that along with an AutoMercado and a PriceSmart coming to Grecia in the nottoo-distant future, there's also a Pequeño Mundo being planned.

**Bad C.R. Economic News** – Tourism remains in the dumpster. It is not predicted to turn around anytime soon and is already impacting local economies throughout the country. The unfavorable exchange rate of the dollar to the colon isn't helping, either.

More Trouble Looms for President Chaves – President Rodrigo Chaves has been indicted on criminal fraud charges, and for the first time for any Costa Rican president, he faces the possible loss of immunity and could face trial while still in office. A final decision on whether his immunity should be removed will come soon from an independent investigative panel.

**Editor's Pride** – Your editor volunteers at **Fundacion SONAR**. Our pride and joy project, *Caribe Sinfónico*, is an artistic musical effort that began during the pandemic. It attempts to give credit to the 400+ years of contributions to Costa Rica made by the Afro-descendants and indigenous peoples of Limón Province. 

## **U.S. Government Changes Impacting Expats**

Tariffs, Retirement Savings, and the Cost of Living – A U.S. appeals court has ruled that many of the U.S. president's tariffs are illegal. The court is letting them stand temporarily until October. It is unclear what the courts will ultimately determine or how the tariffs remaining in place for another month will impact the Costa Rica economy, the cost of products bought in the U.S. and shipped here. Also undetermined is the tariff's impact on inflation, overall economic conditions, exchange rates, and the cost of living. It may be good news for the Costa Rica economy and for expat buying power. Stay tuned.

The "de minimus" import exemption has ended in the U.S. This means that <u>commercial parcels</u> with a value of \$800 or less are no longer exempt from tariff taxation. Under normal circumstances, this would likely impact us in Costa Rica if the item or components of products are imported to the U.S. and re-sent or assembled in the U.S. from imported parts and resent to us in Costa Rica.

While the personal gifts exemption of a \$100 maximum value per person per day that is still in place from the U.S. perspective, the government of Costa Rica has instructed Correos to temporarily suspend all shipments to the U.S. until the newly implemented tariffs can be renegotiated. Until the situation is resolved, we will be unable to send packages of any size, content, or value to the U.S., which, obviously, could have a significant impact among family and friends and small businesses. For the time being, DHL, a very pricey alternative to Correos, appears to be your only option.

**Immigration** – Since our last issue, the U.S. had threatened to deport Kilmar Abrego Garcia to Costa Rica if he pled guilty to human trafficking charges. So, we know that some immigration activity and/or agreements with Costa Rica may be going on in the background. The entire U.S. immigration situation appears to be a moving target and what is accurate one day may not be the same as the next. The U.S. courts are becoming more assertive, as a judge halted the deportation of a plane full of Guatemalan children as it sat on the tarmac awaiting takeoff.

**Social Security** – An SSA whistleblower has stated that the entire SSA database may have been compromised by the DOGE team. If true, it is unclear whether there will be any immediate or long-term consequences for citizens receiving Social Security benefits. If you need to access the SSA, first attempt to call the U.S. Embassy U.S. Citizen Services (2519-2000), which promises to assist.

**Drug Interdiction or an Armed Conflict Nearby?** – The U.S. military has gotten the attention of Venezuela. The U.S. Army is conducting joint maneuvers with the Panamanian military near the Venezuelan border and it has also diverted war ships to the international waters of the southern Caribbean off the Venezuelan coast. Most illegal drugs move north along the Pacific Coast not through the Caribbean. So, is this build up to stop drug flow to the U.S. as claimed or is it to intimidate the government of Venezuela? Film at eleven.
