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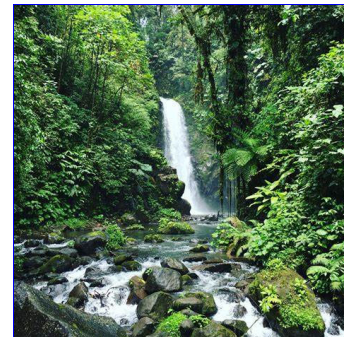

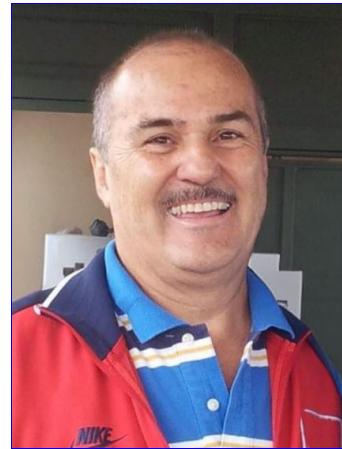
Costa Rica President - Rodrigo Chavez is off the loss-of-immunity hook as the chamber of deputies came up short again in its effort to strip him of his immunity while he's still in office to face fraud and corruption charges.

Driving in C.R. – The number of registered vehicles in Costa Rica has doubled in the last decade, while the kilometers of paved roadway have hardly increased enough to register. In several international studies and surveys, Metro San Jose ranks #2 as the worst commute driving in the world behind only Lagos, Nigeria. This is based not only on average kms/hr, but hours of commute congestion, road conditions, traffic volume, and driver stress. Ruta 1 has reopened west of San Ramon. The construction of overpass connectors from Ruta 1 to Ruta 154 south of Grecia still does not appear to have commenced.

Dollar Exchange - The Central Bank said to expect the exchange rate to be between 500 and 510. It ain't a happenin' thing, folks; as of Saturday 3 January 2026, the rate was 497.17 colones = \$1.

Taxes Due – A reminder that the annual impuesto de Sociedad (corporate tax) is due to be paid by 31/01/26. (They are now supposed to be paid online using the new system for corporations established by the Hacienda, but that is yet to be confirmed.) If unpaid, a small interest penalty accrues after that date. Property taxes must be paid by the end first quarter at the municipalidad. (Paying in advance for basura pick up for the quarter or the year can

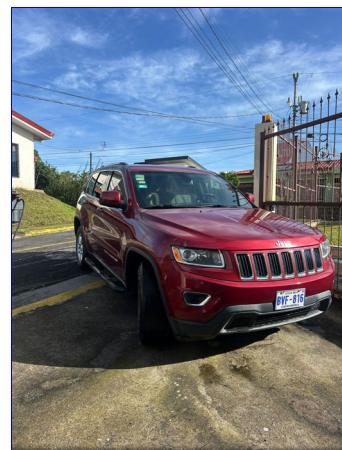

Scams and Violent Crime Haven't Disappeared – A reminder to exercise caution; phone and internet scams and violent crime are on the rise. (Sadly, homicides during the Chaves administration already exceed 3,000 with Quepos and Parrita, not far from the popular Manuel Antonio National Park, becoming violent cartel hotspots.) Be alert and aware and be careful.

On the Cusp of Summer – Our wet weather is nearly a thing of the past. El vientos de navidad (the Christmas winds) are with us again. Warm or hot afternoons are becoming the norm. Here's the December and YTD rainfall for El Cajon de Grecia and San Juan de Sarchi. Thanks to Irina and Tom.

For annual temps, we only have the average high and low temps for Cajon, and high/low temps for Sarchi. They are not the same measurement, but average temps are similar and hopefully will give you an idea.

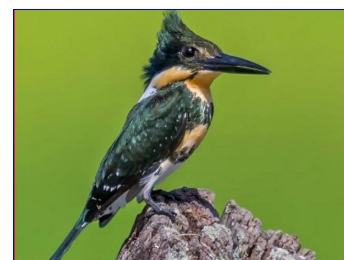

U.S. Government Changes Impacting Expats

Caribbean Armed Conflict Over Oil – First, we saw U.S. warships and troops in Caribbean waters, continued elimination of small craft off the coasts of Venezuela and the Southern Pacific by the U.S. military, then, the boarding and seizure of oil tankers, plus threatened de-flagging of renegade tankers by Panama. Those actions have just turned into a U.S. invasion of Venezuela, and the kidnapping and promised prosecution of its leader, Nicolas Maduro, and his wife. Such an incursion is clearly illegal according to both U.S. and international law and is, obvious to your editor, a unilateral act of war, made without consulting or even informing the U.S. Congress. Also clear, it was never about drugs, but a feeling by this administration that Venezuela's oil reserves somehow belonged to U.S. refiners, because three refiners were booted out when Venezuela nationalized its oil industry decades ago.

This is a watershed moment in U.S. history, and if you thought the U.S. military would refuse to follow a clearly illegal order, this incident gives you your answer. While it is too early to know how the world responds or what happens next, the U.S. President has also recently threatened Columbia, Cuba, Mexico, and Panama. On a minor note: the U.S. Coast Guard has been welcomed to Costa Rica ports and territorial waters for drug interdiction.

Mixed Messages on the Economy – The U.S. economy appears to be stronger than most folks expected. The U.S. stock markets ended 2025 at or near record highs. However, the government shutdown was blamed for pulling economic results lower at yearend. Lower interest rates, and mixed reviews on unemployment and new jobs haven't softened American consumer concerns over "affordability." Are there two economies? The rise of U.S. stock markets and business economics do not seem to reflect the increased costs and apprehension of the consumer economy.

Travel – Entry to, travel within, and exit from the U.S. will be experiencing numerous changes beginning 1 January 2026, including biometrics (fingerprints and iris scans) for non-U.S. citizens—most of which are making travel much more complicated and inconvenient for everyone, and with significant negative impact for travelers who aren't prepared to comply. In addition, there are changes for international travel that will impact everyone. Overall, the changes are significant and will affect all travelers of all nationalities. Regarding U.S. travel: the changes are apt to affect travelers coming to the U.S. for the World Cup in 2026 and the Olympics in Los Angeles in 2028. 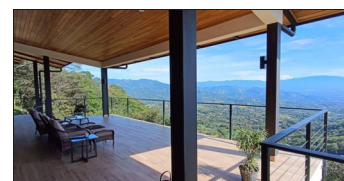

Immigration – A new requirement at entry to the U.S. for most non-U.S. citizen travelers is the pending requirement of providing five years of a traveler's social media activity. To your editor, this sounds like a violation of the 1st Amendment and a potential chaotic disaster for visitors to the U.S. if the effort is attempted to implement it.

Tariffs, Retirement Savings, and the Cost of Living – SCOTUS has yet to rule on the legality of the tariffs that have been implemented but expect a ruling as they return to session. Most prognosticators believe that the regime will use established rules to implement new, specific, targeted tariffs.
